#### **CHAPTER IV**

#### **Review of Past Performance**

#### 1. Labour Bureau

Name of Scheme: Labour & Employment Statistical Systems (LESS).

**Objective of the Scheme:** Major objectives of Labour Bureau plan scheme-LESS-include bringing out statistics in the form of Consumer Price Index Numbers for Industrial Workers [CPI (IW)], Agricultural and Rural Labourers (CPI-AL/RL) and Retail Price Indices of 31 essential commodities. CPI-IW and CPI –AL/RL are brought out with the minimum possible time lag of one month and 20 days respectively from the end of the month and have never been delayed by even a single day since these indices were launched. Retail Price Indices are compiled within a fortnight from the release of CPI-IW and made available to Ministry of Consumer Affairs, Food & Public Distribution.

**Survey Reports:** These include reports on Socio-Economic Surveys, Annual Employment-Unemployment Surveys, Quarterly Surveys on Employment, Annual Survey of Industries, and Occupational Wage Survey etc. These reports are also brought out with the minimum possible time lag. Presently, Labour Bureau is undertaking the quarterly surveys on employment changes in selected sectors of economy and the Annual Employment Unemployment surveys. While the quarterly surveys on employment are conducted and reports thereon are usually brought out within a month and a half from completion of a particular quarter. Annual Employment-Unemployment survey reports are also brought out within 3-4 months from the completion of field work.

Another report brought out by Labour Bureau is on Annual Survey of Industries. These reports are also brought within 7-8 months from the date of data received from NSSO. It may thus be observed that most of the Statistics brought out by Labour Bureau is up-to-date.

Specific objectives of various components of LESS are as under:

## 1.1 Consumer Price Index Numbers for Industrial Workers (CPI-IW).

• The objective of the scheme is to provide uninterrupted serial data on CPI-IW for indexation of wages paid to workers in the organised sector of the economy so as to protect their real income.

- To serve as a guiding factor in determination of dearness allowance being paid to millions of Central/State Government employees as also to the workers in the industrial sectors of the economy.
- To provide database for fixation and revision of minimum wages in scheduled employments.
- To serve as a measure of inflation in retail prices in urban areas.
- To provide serial data for macroeconomic policy formulation.

The Current CPI (IW) series is being compiled on the base 2001=100. This base was introduced w.e.f January, 2006. Indices for a month are released on the last working day of the succeeding month. The Coverage of CPI (IW) extends to 78 centers all over the country. A total of 289 markets are covered for the collection of retail price data. The number of items in the index basket is 370 at all India level.

## 1.2 Rural Labour Enquiry (Including Construction of Consumer Price Index Numbers for Agricultural and Rural Labourers, CPI - AL/RL)

- To provide up-to-date serial data on important socio-economic characteristics of Rural Labour in general and Agricultural Labour in particular.
- To provide data on consumption expenditure for the purpose of derivation of weighting diagram for updating the series of CPI Numbers separately for Agricultural and Rural Labourers.
- To provide index numbers for fixation and revision of minimum wages in the scheduled employments in rural areas under the Minimum Wages Act, 1948.
- To collect, compile and publish wage rate data in respect of 18 agricultural and non-agricultural occupations which is of immense use in drawing up appropriate policies and programmes, conducting cost studies and estimating the National/State income.

## 1.3 Collection of Labour Statistics under the Annual Survey of Industries (Extension to Sample Sector)

- To build series of data base on Employment, Absenteeism, Labour Turnover, Earnings and Labour Cost in Manufacturing Sector not covered under the Census Sector.
- To disseminate information and analyze various components of Labour Cost such as Wage/Salary, Bonus, Social Security and Staff Welfare Cost in this sector.
- To provide comprehensive, factual and systematic data on different aspects of labour for future planning and policy formulation.

## 1.4 Occupational Wage Survey

Under Occupational Wage Survey (OWS), Occupational wage data are collected in respect of workers in selected Plantations, Mines and Manufacturing Industries at periodic intervals, so as to facilitate generation of an up to-date data base. The main objectives of OWS are:

- To obtain occupation-wise data on employment, wage rates and dearness allowance for building up base year weights for updating the base of Wage Rate Index Numbers.
- To obtain data on different components of pay roll earnings for different occupations for scientific studies of inter-industry and intra-industry differentials earnings in Plantation, Mining & Manufacturing Industries.

## 1.5 Socio-Economic Surveys of Different Segments of Labour (SESDSL)

- Conducting surveys on an All –India basis so as to generate and disseminate data for formulation of meaningful policies aimed at ameliorating the working and living conditions of SC/ST workers, workers in the unorganised sector and women workers.
- Evaluating the implementation of Minimum Wages Act, 1948 in different employments, both in organised and unorganized sector.
- Studying the industry wise trends in wages, employment, skill requirements, social security, etc. of the target groups following the liberalization /globalization of Indian economy.
- Conducting quarterly surveys (enterprise based) on employment changes in selected sectors of economy.

#### 1.6 Modernisation of Machine Tabulation Unit

- Computerisation of all the schemes of the Bureau in a phased manner.
- Implementation of National E-Governance Plan (NEGP) of the Govt. of India.
- Regular updation and Maintenance of Labour Bureau's website.

## 1.7 Employment-unemployment Survey

Conducting employment-unemployment surveys (household based) at all-India level with annual interval.

### 1.8 Base Updation of CPI-IW Index

The objective of updation of base year of the CPI (IW) is to accurately reflect changes in the consumption pattern of industrial workers over time. The CPI (IW), on scientific lines, was first introduced with base 1960=100 which was updated on 1982=100. Last revision updated the base to 2001=100. The need for frequent revision of the base on account of fast changing consumption pattern of the target group has been reiterated by national/international agencies such as International Labour Organisation, National Statistical Commission, National Commission on Labour and also Technical Advisory Committee on Statistics of Prices and Cost of Living. To ensure the capturing of latest consumption pattern of the target group, it is proposed to further update the base of current series on base 2001=100 to a recent period. The process of updation has already been initiated.

#### 1.9 Creation of Infrastructural Facilities – Office Building of Labour Bureau

Presently labour Bureau office at Chandigarh is housed partly in a rented building and partly in Kendriya Sadan. It is proposed to construct own office building of Labour Bureau at Chandigarh headquarters to cater to its needs in terms of sufficient office space at one place, trainings, library, record room, printing unit, meetings, workshops, etc.

### 1.10 Base Updation of CPI (AL/RL)

- To provide data on Consumer Price Index numbers for AL/RL on continuous basis based on the latest consumption pattern of the respective target groups as the existing series is based on the obsolete consumption pattern drawn from Consumer Expenditure data collected during 38th Round of NSS in 1983.
- To provide uninterrupted wage rate data in respect of agricultural and non-agricultural occupations.

The need for frequent revision of the base on account of fast changing consumption pattern of rural and agricultural labour has been reiterated at various platforms such as International Labour Organization, National Statistical Commission, National Labour Commission and also Technical Advisory Committee on Statistics of Prices and Cost of Living.

## 1.11 Base updation of Wage Rate Indices (WRI)

Presently Labour Bureau is compiling WRI in respect of industries with 1963-65=100 as the base. The base updation of WRI assumes importance in light of the following developments that have taken place over the years.

- Many new important industries have emerged, which need to be covered under Wage Rate Index.
- The occupational pattern has undergone significant changes in post liberalization era resulting in emergence of many new occupations and disappearance of many old ones at the same time.
- Most of the existing sample units have lost their representation due to closure of industrial units, improvement in technology, fall in employment and emergence of new units in different industries.

#### 2A Board of Arbitration

The CGITs-cum-LCs have been set up under the Industrial Disputes Act, 1947 for adjudication of cases referred to it. No Physical target is fixed because CGIT-cum-Labour Courts deal with judicial cases. In order to take care of the huge pendency of unresolved industrial disputes, the alternative grievance Redressal mechanism of Lok Adalats introduced as a separate scheme in X Five Year Plan within the adjudication system of the CGITs, has been made an indispensable part of the system in the XI Plan.

## **2C** International Cooperation

- 1. The unique tripartite structure of the ILO gives an equal voice to workers, employers and governments to ensure that the views of the social partners are closely reflected in labour standards and in shaping policies and programmes.
- 2. The ILO was founded in 1919, in the wake of a destructive war, to pursue a vision based on the premise that universal, lasting peace can be established only if it is based on social justice. The ILO became the first specialized agency of the UN in 1946.
- 3. The main aims of the ILO are to promote rights at work, encourage decent employment opportunities, enhance social protection and strengthen dialogue on work-related issues.
- 4. The International Labour Organization (ILO) is the only tripartite U.N. agency with government, employer, and worker representatives. This tripartite structure makes the ILO a unique forum in which the governments and the social partners of the economy of its 185 Member States can freely and openly debate and elaborate labour standards and policies.
- 5. The ILO accomplishes its work through three main bodies (The International labour Conference, the Governing body and the Office) which comprise governments', employers' and workers' representatives.

- 6. The work of the Governing Body and of the Office is aided by tripartite committees covering major industries. It is also supported by committees of experts on such matters as vocational training, management development, occupational safety and health, industrial relations, workers' education, and special problems of women and young workers.
- 7. International labour standards and the broad policies of the ILO are set by the International Labour Conference, which meets annually. Often called an international parliament of labour, the Conference is also a forum for discussion of key social and labour questions.
- 8. The Governing Body is the executive body of the International Labour Organization (the Office is the secretariat of the Organization). It meets three times a year, in March, June and November. It takes decisions on ILO policy, decides the agenda of the International Labour Conference, adopts the draft Programme and Budget of the Organization for submission to the Conference, and elects the Director-General.
- 9. It is composed of 56 titular members (28 Governments, 14 Employers and 14 Workers) and 66 deputy members (28 Governments, 19 Employers and 19 Workers). Ten of the titular government seats are permanently held by States of chief industrial importance (Brazil, China, France, Germany, India, Italy, Japan, the Russian Federation, the United Kingdom and the United States). The other Government members are elected by the Conference every three years (the last elections were held in June 2011). The Employer and Worker members are elected in their individual capacity. The next election of the Governing Body of ILO is due on 2<sup>nd</sup> June, 2014.
- 10. The ILO secretariat, operational headquarters, research centre and publishing house, are based in the International Labour Office, Geneva. Administration and management are decentralized in regional, area, and branch offices.
- 11. India is a founder member of the ILO and has been playing a leading role in its activities since its inception. Being one of the 10 countries of chief industrial importance, India holds a non-elective seat in the Government Group of the Governing Body, which is the executive wing of the organisation.
- 12. The ILO is financed mainly by contribution received from the member states. The ILO Budget follows the calendar year and annual contributions are paid by the Governments of the member states according to a scale which is fixed by the International Labour Conference on a year to year basis and which follows the U.N. scale of assessment. An amount of Swiss Frances 2,531,642 equivalent to Rs.16,35,58,927 including P&T Charges) has been paid as India's share of contribution (Swiss Frances 2,531,642 as contribution and 13 Swiss Frances as transfer fee) for the year 2015. Due to timely payment of our contribution to the ILO budget, we are getting substantial incentive every year. This year India has been allowed a credit of Rs.2,13,792 (equivalent to 3144 Swiss Frances) under the Incentive Scheme of ILO. An amount of Rs. 17,53,00,000 has been proposed in Budget Estimates of financial -2015-2016.

### **3A 3 PROMOTIONAL ACTIVITIES**

(a) Prime Minister's Shram Awards (PMSA)

The Prime Minister's Shram Awards (PMSA) Scheme was instituted in 1985, for the workers (as defined in industrial Dispute Act, 1947) in recognition of outstanding contribution in organizations both in public sector and private sector and who have distinguished record of performance, devotion to duty of high order, specific contribution in the field of productivity, proven innovative abilities, presence of mind and exceptional courage and also to the workmen who have made supreme sacrifice of laying down their lives in the conscientious discharge of their duties. Public and private sector organizations employing 500 or more workers are eligible to participate in this scheme.

There are total 33 awards to be shared by both public and private sector organizations. The awards, in order of precedence, are Shram Ratna, Shram Bhushan, Shram Vir /Veerangana and Shram Shree/Devi. The recognition consists of a Sanad and cash award of `2 Lakhs (1 award), `1 Lakh each (4 awards), `60,000/- each (12 awards) and `40,000/- each (16 awards) respectively.

The DGFASLI on behalf of the Ministry of Labour & Employment has been implementing the Vishwakarma Rashtriya Puraskar (VRP) (earlier known as Shram Vir National Awards) and the National Safety Awards scheme since 1965. These schemes were modified in 1970 and again in the year 1977. The schemes presently in operation are as under:

- i) **Vishwakarma Rashtriya Puraskar:** It is designed to give recognition at the national level to outstanding suggestions resulting in (i) higher productivity, (ii) improvement in safety and working conditions, (iii) savings in foreign exchange (import substitution as well as quality and safety of products), (iv) improvement in overall efficiency of the establishments. It covers workers employed in factories, docks, construction sites and nuclear installations. Applications for the awards under this Scheme are invited every year and these are forwarded by the management on behalf of the workers. Prizes are grouped in three classes i.e. CLASS (A) 5, CASH AWARD OF `75,000/- EACH, CLASS (B) 8, CASH AWARD OF `50,000/- EACH AND CLASS (C) 15, CASH AWARD OF `25,000/- EACH.
- ii) **National Safety Awards:** National Safety Awards are given in recognition of good safety performance on part of the industrial establishments registered under the Factories Act, 1948, the employers covered under the Dock Worker (Safety, Health and Welfare) Act, 1986 and Building and Other Construction Workers (Regulation of Employment and Conditions of Service) Act, 1996 and installations under the Atomic Energy Regulatory Board (AERB) Shields and Citation Certificates are awarded to Winners and Runners up. Schemes I to X are meant for factories, constructions sites and Installations under AERB and Schemes XI and XIII are for Ports.

#### 5 Child Labour

## 5.1 Name of the Schemes/Programmes: National Child Labour Project (NCLP) Scheme including Grant-in-Aid Scheme

Objective of the Scheme/Programme: a) The National Child Labour Project seeks to rehabilitate children withdrawn from work with focus on children engaged in hazardous occupations by enrolling them in NCLP Special Training Centres. The Package of benefits to Child Labour for their rehabilitation includes bridge education, vocational training, nutrition, health care, stipend, etc. The other activities include stricter enforcement of Child Labour related laws, raising awareness against the evils of Child Labour and extension of welfare activities to Child Labour.

b) The objective of the Grant-in-Aid scheme is to identify Child Labour and to make available to them welfare inputs through special Training Centres run by voluntary organizations. Under this Scheme, only those districts are covered which are not covered under National Child Labour Project. The amount of assistance given by the Ministry of Labour for taking up the projects for Child Labour is 75% of the total cost of the project. The remaining part of the cost is to be borne by the organization concerned.

Targets and Achievements in past years: a) NCLP Scheme is approved in 270 districts of the country. Continuous efforts by the Government of India had led to withdrawing of children of age group of 9 to 14 years from hazardous occupations/processes with the objective of providing educational/vocational training, nutrition/mid-day-meal, stipend and health care as well as recreation. Efforts have been made for convergence with other Schemes of Government of India for rehabilitation of Child Labour and income generation of parents. b) Under the Grant-in-Aid Scheme, at present about 20 NGOs/VOs are being financially assisted by the Ministry for running Special Training Centres. All ongoing projects are intended to benefit 4,000 children (approx.). These children are being provided with formal/non-formal education, stipend, nutrition, health checkup, vocational training through special Training Centres.
